## Can I Get A Witness?

I enjoy being a person of faith. I don't apologize for it and I proudly share that I am a Christian. Why? I love - actually love - my relationship with the Triune God. My journey has not been all hearts and roses. Sometimes, letting go of the old me to embrace the me that is intended has even been painful. But the transformative process God has provided through the redemption of Christ and the power of the Spirit brings me joy, even when that transformation becomes hard. I hope everyone is joyful about the relationship they have with the Triune God and see the journey as beneficial to them personally. The journey is more than salvation and getting to Heaven. Most of you have heard me say salvation is the starting block, not the finish line. My passion for my personal journey overflows into bringing the possibility of a journey to those that have yet to come to know (or marginally know) the God of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. While I know their journey will be different, the journey starts the same: an introduction through our witness to what God has done in us through Jesus and the Spirit.

Witnessing is called evangelism. Christians evangelize through our words and how we live our life, or showing and sharing the Good News. So important is evangelism that it is included in the baptismal vows of the United Methodist Church: I promise to uphold the church with my prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness.

It is important to foster a church family atmosphere for people that have yet to come to know the joy of the journey, that has a culture that creates a safe space for them to BELONG before they BELIEVE. Surprisingly, the number of agnostics, atheists, and "nones" (those religiously unaffiliated) is growing in the United States, with "nones" increasing much more quickly than the other two categories.
> "The percentage of Americans without religious affiliation is around 20-29\%. Most of the increase in the unaffiliated comes from people that had a weak or no commitment to religion in the first place, not from people who had a religious commitment." ${ }^{1}$

Today, most churches are facing lifespan issues. Not only are congregations aging physically, churches are dying rapidly. The desire to live rather than die has caused some churches to shift their priorities to platforms based on entertaining people to keep them or lure people from other churches to build numbers. Crowds gather but evangelism efforts to those who have yet to begin their faith journey are weak. Other churches just continue doing what they have always done, attempting to believe that everyone goes to church and believes in Jesus. Many congregations have traded evangelism for passionate service and justice work rather than for the passion of sharing Jesus. It is a path of least resistance Christianity. No one is uncomfortable so long as we serve as Christians who don't have to share our witness.

Jesus told us as the church what to do as he ascended: "You will receive my power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:18) As followers of Jesus Christ, transformed by that very same Spirit, we are called to utilize that power to propel us to others, drawing lost people to Christ. According to a Barn survey, $46 \%$ of Christians feel it is culturally inappropriate to evangelize while at the same time stating it is part of Jesus' mission for us. In other words, "I don't like to push my religion on others; that is not polite, but I know that is what Jesus said to do." It reminds me of when my grandmother said don't talk about politics or religion when guests are over for dinner. But what if one of those guests had not met Jesus? Yet, in America, it seems as if our witness has been reduced to creating laws to push Christian values rather than be of Christian value ourselves.

Our evangelical audience isn't those already filled with the power. It is those who have yet to encounter the saving grace, love, and redemption of Jesus Christ. Those of us filled with the power gather to recharge and go out. But as we gather, our space also needs to be welcoming and ready for those that come with others, drop in, or wander in lost. The Greek word for that type of love is "storge."We must approach people with that type of hospitality and empathy. People need to be heard and loved along the way of their spiritual journey, even when we don't agree. As I wrote earlier, create a safe space for people to BELONG before they BELIEVE.

I challenge you to honestly ponder these questions this week and the weeks to come:

- Am I passionate about Jesus, so much so that I yearn for others to know Jesus like I do? Better than I do?
- Why do I really come to church? What do I seek from church? Community? Friends? Fun? The opportunity to be open to those coming and seeking?
- How do I offer hospitality and passionate evangelism to those that need Jesus inside the church and out in the community?
- Have I become part of a "holy huddle" - a small group of friends with little concern for the brokenness around me?
- Am I willing to ask God to give me a weekly opportunity to evangelize others in a safe, empathetic, and loving way that gives them an open door to Jesus Christ?
- Am I willing to go first?
